




- Launched June 2018 by Midwest Association of Fish and Wildlife Agencies and the U. S.

Priority One: Prioritize at-risk species and/or species of greatest conservation need.



Goal I: Preclude the need to list species as threatened or endangered under federal and/or state law

Goal 2: Coordinate efforts for priority species-at-risk that cross jurisdictions, reducing the burden on any individual entity.

Priority Two: Develop habitat inventory and assessment tools across landscapes

Goal I: Inform strategic use of conservation resources toward natural communities and landscapes with an increased probability for conservation success.

Goal 2: Provide assessment tools that allow for integration and interoperability with other regional tools, where appropriate and desired by the members.

Goal 3: Evaluate the effectiveness of conservation management actions within landscapes.

Priority Three: Provide wind energy development support to avoid or mitigate negative wildlife interactions

Goal: Avoid or minimize the direct and negative impacts of wind power generation on wildlife and the surrounding environment

Objective I: Identify what wildlife resources are most critical to avoid and minimize impacts for the Midwest

Objective 2: Synthesize and share existing best practices across the region and with other regions.

Priority Four: Develop a long-lasting governance model and unifying conservation vision across the region

Goal I: Provide sustainable and long-term vision of what conservation challenges face the Midwest region into the next 5-20 years

Goal 2: Create unity among the various partners and a forum to support challenging and informing dialog about conservation needs

Objective I: Create a strategic vision of conservation, which includes robust input from and consideration of the members and other practitioners in the region affected by conservation decisions

Objective 2: Draft a charter and communication plan, which is malleable to change but not weakened by it.
